Devpolicy and DFAT's Office of Development Effectiveness (ODE) co-organise a twice-yearly forum on aid evaluations. The events run for three hours and are held at ANU in Canberra. Two or three evaluations are covered in each. The discussion of each evaluation involves a presentation from the evaluator, followed by a presentation from a person involved in running the aid activity that was evaluated. Then, a third presentation is given by a discussant with aid evaluation expertise.

Do you have an evaluation you are proud of? Do you want to show the rest of the aid community that your organisation believes in good evaluations? Would you like an evaluation from your organisation to be part of the next Australian Aid Evaluation Forum?

The next forum will be held in early April 2018.
